WIND & CARBON

Nebraska Farmers Union (NEFU), Nebraska Public Power (NPPD), The Nebraska Wind Working Group, and the Northeast Nebraska RC&D will be teaming up at the Lied Auditorium on Thursday, June 12th at 7:00 PM for an informational meeting on "Wind Energy and The Carbon Credit Program."

NEFU President John K. Hansen, who is also Co-Chair of the Nebraska Wind Working Group will give a presentation on the different wind energy development models available to Nebraska, including the new Community-Based Energy Development (C-BED) model.

NPPD Renewable Energy Development Manager David Rich will give an update on current NPPD wind energy developments and what might be expected in the near future. Rich will also address the issue of wind easement lease agreements.

Also on the program agenda is Public Affairs Director Graham Christensen. Christensen will be informing producers about the No-Till, Newly Seeded Grasses, and Rangeland Management Programs, the current enrollment pools and their deadlines, and the recent surge in the value of carbon credits.

There will be lots of handouts and information available. Nebraska Farmers Union is also co-sponsoring the evening and will be providing refreshments. Contact The Library or Susan Fields at 368-5893 with questions.

ANTHONY B. SCHUTZ TO SPEAK & Shell Creek Water Quality Testing with Mark Seier & Students

As a part of the "Between Fences" exhibit the library will feature a special program Sunday, June 22 at 7:00 PM in the Lied Auditorium. Science students from Newman Grove and their instructor, Mark Seier, will be on hand to share about the testing they do along Shell Creek for water quality. Also presenting that evening will be the Nebraska state scholar for "Between Fences" and UNL law professor, Anthony B. Schutz, to share some of the legal aspects of water and water quality as they relate to the boundaries we establish.

Seier and his science students have been testing for water quality and flow at various sites along Shell Creek for several years. They will share exactly how and what they test, as well as, some of the trends they are finding. The students take a very active role in this project and the scope of testing and number of students involved grows over time.

Each time a Smithsonian Exhibition tours, a scholar is appointed to study various aspects of the subject and be available to share with participating communities. Mr. Schutz is a native Nebraskan. As a law professor he teaches in the areas of agricultural law, water law, environmental law, land use law, and state and local government. He has written about the invisible "fences" or lines we have established in our society.
